- Legal and Ethical Considerations: Overview of constitutional protections, civil rights implications, and departmental policies related to bias-based policing.
- Prevention Strategies: Practical approaches to prevent racial profiling, including cultural competency, implicit bias awareness, and community engagement techniques.
